The Education (School Donations) Amendment Bill was introduced into the House of Representatives on 30 May 2019. The Bill amends the Education Act 1989.

From the 2020 school year, Decile 1-7 state and stateintegrated schools will be able to choose to receive a \$150 per student, per year payment if they agree not to ask parents and caregivers for donations.

This initiative is designed to alleviate that pressure and expectation. It also recognises that Decile 1-7 schools can find it difficult to raise funds from their communities.

At a recent Board of Trustees meeting we agreed to opt into the government donations scheme for 2020. This means that parents will not be asked to pay the annual school donation.

The \$150 per student will be used to cover the costs related to curriculum-based trips and visits. Parents will still be required to give permission for these educational excursions but will not be asked to contribute to the costs of the trip.

There are some exceptions and these include stationery and activities that are optional. Examples of these are sport, which students can opt into (Netball, Touch, Tag, Soccer etc), overnight stays such as the Year 6 camps and non-curriculum trips.

The Board and SLT hope that by adopting this scheme it will ease the beginning of the year financial burden for families and allow more students to opt into more of optional activities on offer throughout the year. This scheme is reviewable annually so the Board can assess the success of its adoption at the end of 2020 and decide whether to continue.

<u>Room 17</u>

Last week during Room 17's STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths) lesson, we learned all about the Water Cycle.
